Summary: Paul, a follower of Jesus, wrote the book of Romans to help the church at Rome understand the Gospel message. 

NAVIGATING A BROKEN WORLD: IS THERE MORE THAN ONE WAY TO GO TO HEAVEN?

Almost half of American adults believe you can work your way to heaven.* Some preschoolers may hear different things from their family or friends about how to go to heaven. Our culture often exposes kids to a work-based approach to get to heaven. As kids have questions, point them to scripture such as John 3:16, John 6:40, John 10:9 and Romans 6:23. Remind kids of the truth of God's Word. In today's lesson, kids will learn about how much God loves them. He sent Jesus to save everyone. Everyone can choose to believe in Jesus! Encourage preschoolers to share the good news with everyone, even those who believe differently.

Show the Big Question Teaching Image.

Say: Who is always in control? We will find out who and more about it in today's Bible story!



Hold up a Bible.

Say: Who can tell me the name of this book? *Allow kids to respond.*

Say: Yes! This book is called the Bible. The Bible is the most important book of all. The Bible is full of true stories about how God takes care of His people and loves them. Today we are learning a story from the New Testament in the book of Romans. The New Testament is filled with lots of stories about Jesus' birth, life and what happens afterward.

ROMANS

ROMANS 3:23; 5:8; 6:23

Say: Paul was one of the apostles, which means he was chosen to teach the good news about lesus to everyone.

Show teaching illustration: Paul Preaching (Image 07).

Say: Paul helped start many churches and wrote letters to the churches to help them. The book of Romans is the letter that Paul wrote to the church of Rome.

Say: Now this church was filled with many different kinds of people. *Point to the person next to you.* Everyone was so different and they did not agree on things. Paul wanted to help them understand the **Gospel** better. The **Gospel** is the good news of how Jesus died on the cross and rose again so we can live with Him forever.

Say: Paul told the church that everyone can live forever with God if they believe in Jesus! Let's spell out |esus together! |-E-S-U-S!

Say: Everyone has **sinned** and messed up. **Sin** is anything we think, say or do that disobeys God. Let's spell that together. **S-I-N**. **Sin** separates us from God, but God doesn't want us to be apart from Him.

Say: God showed us His mighty love by loving us when we were still **sinners**. Jesus died for us even though we do wrong things. *Spell out L-O-V-E*. There is nothing we have to do to earn God's love. He gives it freely.

Say: Because of what Jesus did, we can have the free gift of **forgiveness** and live with God forever. Free, **forgiveness** and forever all start with the letter, "F." We can be **f-f-forgiven** of our **sins** and spend f-f-forever with Jesus when we accept the f-f-free gift of God's grace when we choose to trust and believe in Him!





ROMANS

Say: Jesus beat death and rose from the dead so He can be our Rescuer. God loves us so much and wants everyone to trust in Him. Paul wanted the church of Rome and everyone else to know that they could choose to believe in Jesus and be saved.

Show teaching illustration: Letter to Rome (Image 08)

POINT TO JESUS:

Say: God loves you so very much! You are so special to God that He wants to be with you forever! God sent His Son Jesus to take our place and defeat death. When we choose to trust and believe in Jesus as our Savior, we can live with God forever.

Say: Let's close in prayer as we wrap up our Bible story time together. Reach your hands up really high.

Reach hands up high.

Say: Now clap them together like this.

Clap hands together.

Say: Let's pray.

Pray: Dear God, thank You for sending Jesus to save us. Help us to trust in You and share this good news with others. Amen.




REVIEW:

ACTIVITY INTRO:

PREP:

INSTRUCTIONS:



BONUS SCRIPT:

Preschoolers learn best through repetition. Use the script below to review the story at any opportunity. You could review the story while kids play in centers, while they work on their craft, during snack time or while waiting for parents.

Say: Paul was an apostle who shared the good news everywhere he went. He helped to start many churches and often wrote them letters to help them in their faith in Jesus. Paul wrote to the church of Rome to help them understand more about the Gospel and how Jesus came to save everyone. He wrote to share how when we were still sinners, Jesus died on the cross for us. When we trust and believe in Him and choose to accept the free gift of salvation, we can live with God forever.



ARMOR OF GOD

BIBLE PASSAGE FPHFS

EPHESIANS 6:10-18

Summary: Paul wrote his letter to the Ephesians while under house arrest in Rome. Paul had been arrested for preaching about Jesus, but he knew that his real battle wasn't with the officials. Paul told the Ephesians that we are in a battle with the devil and his spiritual forces that want to stop God's plan in the world. He taught that believers must put on the armor of God. We can only fight against the schemes of the

evil one in God's power and with His spiritual weapons. While we may battle evil, God is greater!

Today's Brite Idea is: God is greater than evil.

LEADER TRAINING: BENEFITS OF PRETEND PLAY

Mister Rogers' Neighborhood was a beloved television show that ran from 1968 to 2001. One of the brilliant parts of the show was the "Neighborhood of Make Believe," where Mr. Rogers used puppets to take kids into a world of pretend. This segment resonated with each generation of kids because kids in this age group thrive on pretend play. Pretend play allows kids to experiment with their world, discovering more about themselves and those around them. Centers allow kids in your group to engage in pretend play. By providing play that is guided but not completely directed, kids can explore and pretend. Dress-up clothes and other dramatic play centers can give kids the opportunity to explore Bible truths in ways that stretch their imaginations and broaden their development.

NAVIGATING A BROKEN WORLD: WHAT IS EVIL?

Over 40 percent of people either are not sure or don't believe that Satan is real.* Preschoolers may have never experienced something evil. Use the definition provided in the Preschool Glossary to help explain what evil is in an age-appropriate way. It's not something to frighten them with but instead is a truth that points to how great God is. Today's focus should not be on Satan or evil but rather on the truth of who God is. God is greater than

PRESCHOOL GLOSSARY:

Armor of God: worn to protect a believer in spiritual battles

Evil: bad or wicked

Satan: enemy of God who wants to destroy God's work and His people

everything! We do not have to live in fear of evil knowing who God is and His power.

Bible TEACHING

ARMOR OF GOD

WELCOME:

Say: Welcome everyone! I'm so excited to share with you today's Bible story! My name is ______. Last week we learned about the church of Rome and how Paul wrote a letter named the book of Romans teaching how Jesus came to save everyone.

Show teaching illustration: Letter to Rome (Image 06).

Say: Today, we will learn a true story from the Bible about the armor of God and how God is greater and stronger than any evil or bad thing.

Say: Let's take a look at this month's Big Question. Can you help me do a drumroll? Ready? 1, 2, 3 drumroll!

SUPPLIES:

Bible, teaching pictures, printable page

PREP:

Print the printable page and cut out.

LEADER TIP:

Although this lesson talks about Satan and evil, the focus should not be on those things, but rather on the truth of who God is. God has the victory and is stronger and greater than anything! Focus on this as you help preschoolers understand in an ageappropriate way.



BIG QUESTION

Show the Big Question Teaching Image.

Say: Who is always in control? We'll learn more about this question and what the answer is in today's Bible story!



Hold up a Bible.

Say: Who can tell me the name of this book? *Allow kids to respond.*

Say: Yes! This book is called the Bible. The Bible is the most important book of all. The Bible is full of true stories about how God takes care of His people and loves them. Today we are learning a story from the New Testament in the book of Ephesians. The New Testament is filled with lots of stories about Jesus' birth, life and what happened afterward.

Bible TEACHING

ARMOR OF GOD

ARMOR OF GOD EPHESIANS 6:10-18

Say: Today's Bible story is about the **armor of God**. Does anyone know what armor is used for? *Allow kids to respond*. Armor is used to protect someone; it's used when they are in a battle.

Say: Kind of like helmet, knee and elbow pads. These are used to protect someone when they do something active like riding a bike or a scooter. In today's Bible story, Paul, who shared about Jesus with many people, wrote a letter to a church in Ephesus and told them to put on the **armor of God**.

Say: Now, does that mean followers of God are supposed to wear real armor and protection like a helmet, knee and elbow pads? No, that would be a little silly to wear everywhere we went, wouldn't it? God doesn't give us actual armor to wear, but He does take care of us and protect us.

Say: Did you know that God has an enemy? We don't see him or know what he looks like, but we know that the enemy is **evil** and he wants to stop God's plan. But...is anything stronger or greater than God? No!

Say: The enemy's name is **Satan**, and he does not want people to trust in God, follow God or tell others about Jesus. Isn't that sad? Can you show me your sad faces? *Make a sad face*.

Say: But God is SO much stronger than **Satan**! Can you show me your muscles? *Flex your bicep muscles*. There is nothing greater or stronger than God! God is a good God and He wants to protect us against **evil** and help us share and stand firm in the truth of who God is.

Say: As I share with you each piece of the **armor of God**, I want you to say, "God is greater!" Let's practice together...ready? 1, 2, 3... "God is greater!" Now let's learn about the **armor of God**! Show teaching illustration: The Armor of God (Image 07).

Say: First, there is the belt of truth. Everyone say with me, "God is greater!" This is a reminder to focus on what we know is true about God. We can know what is true about God by learning what the Bible says. We know He is good and loving and with us. Hold up the belt image.





ARMOR OF GOD

Say: Then there is the breastplate of righteousness. "God is greater!" A breastplate is worn on a soldier's chest and protects the front and back of their body. This reminds us our hearts are safe because of God's love and forgiveness. Hold up the breastplate image.

Say: Next are the shoes that help us stand ready. "God is greater!" No matter what happens, we can stand strong in the good news of Jesus. Jesus is greater and stronger than anything! Hold up the shoes image.

Say: The shield of faith protects us from attacks from the enemy. "God is greater!" We can trust in God every day. Our mind is protected by the helmet of God's salvation. We can always remember God's promises and God's power. We can use our minds to think about Him and always have faith in God. Hold up the shield image.

Say: There is one weapon that is listed, and that is the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God—the Bible. "God is greater!" When **Satan** tempted Jesus, Jesus used the truth of God's word to answer him. The Bible is real and true! *Hold up the sword image*.

Say: Last, Paul told the believers to always keep praying. The battle that believers face is not won by how good we are or how hard we try. God is greater and stronger than any **evil** or bad thing. God has the victory! Everyone shout, "God has the victory!" *Show teaching illustration: Praying (Image 08).*

POINT TO JESUS:

Say: Jesus defeated death when He rose three days after dying on the cross for our sins. One day, Jesus will return and make all things new and destroy evil forever. Jesus is greater than anything!

Say: Let's close in prayer as we wrap up our Bible story time together. Reach your hands up really high.

Reach hands up high.

Say: Now clap them together like this.

Clap hands together.

Say: Let's pray.

Pray: Dear God, You are greater than anything, even evil. Help us to put on the full armor of God to trust in You and know the truth about who You are. Amen.



OLDER PRESCHOOL ARMOR OF GOD



SUPPLIES:

Printable page, painter's tape, blindfold, scissors (prep)

PREP:

Print the printable page and cut out. Clear a section of wall where kids can tape up the armor pieces.



LEADER TIP:

Some kids may be scared or have sensory issues with a blindfold. Instead, instruct these kids to close their eyes and try to attach a piece of the armor without looking.

ACTIVITY INTRO:

The Bible teaches us true stories about God. Today we learned about the Armor of God. When we trust Jesus, we get to put on the full armor of God. Let's play a game where we tape the armor of God on the wall together!

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Say: Imagine a soldier getting ready to go into battle. Soldiers put on their armor piece by piece to protect themselves from anything bad that might happen. Just like that soldier, when we follow Jesus, we get spiritual armor—the armor of God. We can't see it, but this armor is made up of things God gives us to help us stand strong and protect us from His enemy.
- 2. Say: Let's take turns putting the armor of God on our soldier up on the wall, but there's a twist! You'll be blindfolded! We will work together as friends to help guide you to know where to tape it onto the wall.
- **3.** When it's a kid's turn, blindfold them or have them close their eyes and gently guide them toward the wall. The other kids can give clues or cheer them on as they try to place the armor in the right spot.
- **4. Ask:** Have you ever worn something to protect yourself, like a bicycle helmet or floaties in the pool? How did it make you feel?



ACTIVITY WRAP-UP:

Wow! Look at our soldier—he's all armored up and ready to stand strong against anything! Just like this soldier, we can stand strong too, because Jesus is greater than everything—even evil! We can put on the armor of God and be ready to live a life that glorifies God!

OLDER PRESCHOOL ARMOR OF GOD



SUPPLIES:

Paper plates (1 per kid), construction paper, coloring supplies, stickers, scissors (prep), tape

PREP:

Cut the construction paper into strips (1 per kid). Tape the construction paper strip onto the backside of the paper plate to create a handle.



INSTRUCTIONS:

- **1. Say:** Let's make something very special—a shield! But this isn't just any shield; it's a shield of faith.
- 2. Ask: Who remembers the shield of faith from today's Bible story?
- **3. Say:** The shield of faith reminds us to have faith and believe Jesus is stronger and bigger than anything else. When we are tempted to do wrong things, we can remember how awesome Jesus is and trust in Him. Jesus is stronger! Let's make our shields together so we can remember how Jesus protects us.
- **4.** Pass out paper plates and have kids decorate them with their coloring supplies and stickers.
- **5.** Write the kid's name on their craft and set them aside for parent pick up.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS (TO BE USED AS KIDS ARE WORKING):

- When we're scared, why should we go to Jesus?
- How do we know that Jesus is greater than all bad things?
- What are the parts of the armor of God?
- Who can you teach this month's memory verse to?



PRAY TOGETHER:

Dear Jesus, thank You for being so good that You can stand against evil. You control all things, and nothing is stronger than You. Amen!

OLDER PRESCHOOL ARMOR OF GOD



SUPPLIES:

Painter's tape

PREP:

Use the painter's tape to create several straight lines on the floor. Make sure the lines are long enough for the kids to practice walking along them. Create different patterns or shapes such as a zigzag or curves for added fun and challenge.



INSTRUCTIONS:


- **1.** Show kids how to walk along the tape line by placing one foot directly in front of the other, heel to toe.
- 2. **Say:** Watch how I walk on the tape line—slow and steady, heel to toe. It's okay if you wobble or step off the line. Just try your best and keep going!
- **3. Say:** Let's practice walking on the tape lines that you see in front of you. Heel to toe, let's try to walk the line. If you can't, that's okay! Just get back on the tape line and keep going.
- **4.** Have the kids take turns walking on the tape lines, practicing their balance.
- **5. Ask:** Was it easy or hard to walk on the line?
- **6. Say:** It was pretty hard, wasn't it? It's hard to follow Jesus perfectly! The good news is that we don't do it alone. Jesus gives us everything we need to follow Him. He followed God's plans perfectly, stood for what was good and stood against evil.
- **7.** Gather kids to sit down together and review the discussion questions.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS (TO BE USED AS KIDS ARE WORKING):

- When we're scared, why should we go to lesus?
- How do we know that Jesus is greater than all bad things?
- What are the parts of the armor of God?
- Who can you teach this month's memory verse to?



BONUS SCRIPT:

Preschoolers learn best through repetition. Use the script below to review the story at any opportunity. You could review the story while kids play in centers, while they work on their craft, during snack time or while waiting for parents.

Say: Paul wrote to the Ephesians to encourage them in their faith. He shared about the armor of God and how important it is. The armor of God helps to protect us against the attacks from the enemy and helps us stand firm in the truth of God. There is the belt of truth, the breastplate of righteousness, shoes to be ready and stand firm, the shield of faith, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God.



LIVING HOPE

BIBLE PASSAGE

1 PETER 1-5; 2 PETER 3

Summary: Peter wrote a letter to churches where believers were scattered throughout the Roman Empire. The believers were being persecuted for following Jesus. Paul assured them that Jesus is our living hope. When we suffer for doing good, our faith grows stronger. We can trust God because we find our hope in Him.

Today's Brite Idea is: God is greater than our suffering.

LEADER TRAINING: UNDERSTANDING EMOTIONS

By age four, kids begin to develop empathy. Not only can they understand how someone feels, they can respond to that person in a caring way. Empathy requires practice and a lot of modeling. When discussing Bible stories, talk about the feelings of the characters. Identify what would make them happy, hopeful, or sad and why. Model for kids how to care for others in the group who are sad or mad. Help kids talk about their feelings. Encourage kids to help each other. By making these practices standard in our group, you can help the kids build their empathy skills.

NAVIGATING A BROKEN WORLD: SUFFERING

Over 360 million Christians experience significant persecution in the countries they live.* The consequences of believing in Jesus for some Christians means risking their lives. Though American kids do not face this level of persecution, the post-Christian culture makes it less friendly to believers. The challenge nowadays is to raise resilient disciples to know, love and follow Jesus. In today's Bible story, kids will learn that our true hope

is only found in Jesus. And sometimes, we may share in His suffering. These are big ideas that we don't expect preschoolers to comprehend just yet, but we can pray for those who face suffering for believing in Jesus.

PREP:

Engage kids in today's Bible story by having them jump up when you say "living hope." Encourage kids to sit right back down so that you can continue teaching the Bible story.

Say: Then we learned about the armor of God and how we can put it on to stand firm in the truth of God.

Show teaching illustration: The Armor of God (Image 07).

Say: Today, we will learn a true story from the Bible about how we can hope in Jesus and always trust in Him.

Say: Let's take a look at this month's Big Question. Can you help me do a drumroll? Ready? 1, 2, 3 drumroll!



Show the Big Question Teaching Image.

Say: Who is always in control? We'll learn more about this in today's Bible story.



Hold up a Bible.

Say: Who can tell me the name of this book? *Allow kids to respond.*

Say: Yes! This book is called the Bible. The Bible is the most important book of all. The Bible is full of true stories about how God takes care of His people and loves them. Today we will learn a story from the New Testament in the books of 1 Peter and 2 Peter. The New Testament is filled with lots of stories about Jesus' birth, life, and what will happen next.

LIVING HOPE

(1 PETER 1-5; 2 PETER 3)

Say: Touch your nose if you've ever heard the word **hope**. Sometimes we may say, "I **hope** it doesn't rain today." Or, "I **hope** I'll get lots of presents on my birthday!" When we **hope** for something, we really want it to happen.

Say: In today's Bible story, we are learning about another type of **hope** that is even better than just wanting something to happen. **Hope** in the Bible means that we can trust everything will be okay because we have Jesus on our side!

Say: I need all of you to squat down and on the count of three we will jump up as high as we can and say "Living **hope**!" Are you ready? 1, 2, 3...Jump up and say "Living **hope**!"

Say: Throughout today's Bible story, when I point to you, I want you to jump up and say "Living **hope**!"

Say: Peter, a leader of the church, and many of the believers were having a difficult time. They were sharing the good news of Jesus. *Make a smiley face*. Show me your happy face. But they were being **persecuted** for their faith. That means that some people were being really mean to them because they followed Jesus. *Make a sad face*. Show me your sad face. *Show teaching illustration: Peter (Image 08)*.

Say: Peter wrote a letter that was shared from church to church to help all the believers not to give up. *Make a smiley face*. Show me a happy face. This is where Peter told the believers they have a living **hope**. *Point to the kids*.

Say: Hope is knowing that we can trust in Jesus and everything will be okay. Jesus rose three days after dying on the cross and is alive! Jesus is our living **hope**! *Point to the kids*. No matter what is happening around us, we can focus on Jesus. With this **hope**, we can face hard things and rejoice, for our **hope** does not come from things that will go away. Our **hope** comes from Jesus! *Make a smiley face*. Show me your happy face! *Show teaching illustration: Jesus (Image 09).*





LIVING HOPE

Say: Have you ever had something happen that made you feel sad? Touch your nose if you've ever felt sad. Yes, me too! Have you ever had something happen that hurt? Maybe you bumped your arm or your head and it made you say, "Ouch!" Pat your head if you've ever been hurt. Yes, me too! God has a plan to end all suffering and pain so that one day all of God's people will never be sad and never get hurt again. One day, Jesus will return and make all things new! Jesus is our living **hope!** Point to the kids.

Show teaching illustration: Jesus (Image 09).

POINT TO JESUS:

Say: Jesus gives us hope no matter what is happening around us. Everyone can choose to follow Jesus and believe He died on the cross for their sins and rose again three days later, defeating death. One day He will make all things new, and there will be no more sadness or pain. Jesus is our forever hope!

Say: Let's close in prayer as we wrap up our Bible story time together. Reach your hands up really high.

Reach hands up high.

Say: Now clap them together like this.

Clap hands together.

Say: Let's pray.

Pray: Dear God, thank You for sending Jesus! No matter what we face, help us to hope in Jesus and know He is always faithful and with us. Amen.

LEADER TRAINING: CONTROL ISSUES

We all know adults who struggle with control issues, but those issues usually pale in comparison to the bossiness of a four-year-old. Preschool kids are learning how to take initiative and do things on their own, but they haven't learned all of the social rules in how to do so. They are still learning that they shouldn't tell others what to do or that they can't always have their way. We can help kids learn how to better interact with others, modeling for them new ways to handle challenging situations. Perhaps give the "bossy" child choices of how to better handle a situation, such as, "Susie is playing with the blocks right now. Would you like to play with something else until she's done, or would you like to ask if you could play together?" You can also model how to speak to others. For example, "Jack, what if you tried saying, 'Sammy, could you please hand me the crayon?'" Bossy kids often grow into strong leaders but need direction to learn how to interact with others.

NAVIGATING A BROKEN WORLD: DISCIPLING KIDS IN PAIN

Over half of the adults in the United States—64 percent—report they have had at least one Adverse Childhood Experience, and more than two-thirds of kids report they have had at least one traumatic experience before the age of 16.* This means that at least two out of every three kids in your ministry will have experienced trauma by the time they reach high school. This means the majority of kids are suffering and dealing with difficult circumstances. In

today's Bible story, kids will learn that God is greater than our circumstances. He is greater than our pain, and He is greater than anything that may go wrong. As one helps to develop kids in their faith, be mindful of these statistics as you care and point kids to the ultimate source of our hope, Jesus.

PHILEMON

Say: Yes! This book is called the Bible. The Bible is the most important book of all. The Bible is full of true stories about how God takes care of His people and loves them. Today we are learning a story from the New Testament in the book of Philemon. The New Testament is filled with lots of stories about Jesus' birth, life and what happens afterward.

PHILEMON PHILEMON

Say: Today's true story from the Bible has a lot of different people and some names that are a little hard to pronounce. I have asked some special helpers to join me to help us understand the story.

Say: First, there was a man named Onesimus. *Motion to helper #1*. Let's say that name together, "oh-nis-us-mus." Onesimus lived in a place called Colossae. He worked for a man named Philemon. *Motion to helper #2*. Let's say that name together, "phi-lee-mun."

Say: One day, Onesimus made a bad choice that upset Philemon. So, Onesimus ran away. *Instruct helper #1 to run around the room.* Eventually, he went to a place called Rome. *Show teaching illustration: Onesimus (Image 09).*

Say: In Rome, there was another man whose name was Paul. *Motion to helper #3*. Paul had been arrested in Rome for sharing about Jesus. Onesimus met with Paul in Rome. *Bring helpers #1 and #3 together*.

Say: Do you think Paul told Onesimus about Jesus too? *Allow kids to respond.* Yes, he did! Paul told Onesimus all about who Jesus was and what Jesus had done. Onesimus trusted in Jesus and chose to follow Him! *Have helper #1 jump with excitement and point up to the sky for following Jesus.*

Say: Now, remember Philemon? *Motion to helper #2*. Paul not only knew who Philemon was, they were friends! Paul decided to write a letter to him to be kind and to forgive Onesimus.

Say: He shared how Onesimus *motion to helper #1* was a follower of Jesus and had been very helpful to him. He hoped Philemon would be nice to Onesimus and encouraged Onesimus to do the right thing and return home.





PHILEMON

Say: Then Paul did something surprising! *Motion to helper #3*. Paul offered to pay whatever Onesimus owed to Philemon. He offered to repay the **debt** for Onesimus! *Motion to helper #1*. Paul wrote he was sure Philemon would do as Paul had asked. Show teaching illustration: Paul and Onesimus (Image 10).

Say: That's where today's Bible story ends! The Bible doesn't tell us the rest of the story. We don't know what Philemon decided to do or what happened to Onesimus when he returned home. But we do know that God allowed Onesimus to meet Paul and hear the good news.

POINT TO JESUS:

Say: Paul offered to pay Onesimus' debt, which reminds us of the greater debt that Jesus paid for us. God loves us so much that He sent His one and only Son Jesus to die on the cross to pay the debt of our sins. Jesus never sinned or did anything wrong, but He took our place so when we believe in Him we can live with God forever.

Say: Let's close in prayer as we wrap up our Bible story time together. Reach your hands up really high.

Reach hands up high.

Say: Now clap them together like this.

Clap hands together.

Say: Let's pray.

Pray: Dear God, thank You for being greater than anything we may face. Thank You for loving us so much. We love You! Amen.

You all did a fantastic job sharing how you're feeling today! It was so great to hear everyone encouraging each other! Remember, Jesus is always greater than anything we face, and we can trust Him no matter what.

PREP:

That was a fun and silly game! God worked through Paul and Philemon to help more people know and follow Jesus. Jesus is greater than anything!

- **4.** As the kids begin decorating, walk around and encourage them. Help them with ideas if needed, and ask them about who they might want to bless with their box.
- **5.** Remind them that generosity, no matter how big or small, is a way to reflect God's love and kindness.
- **6.** Write the kid's name on their craft and set them aside for parent pick up.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS (TO BE USED AS KIDS ARE WORKING):

- Why did Onesimus run away?
- How did Paul help Onesimus?
- Why did Paul offer to send money to Philemon?
- What do you think Philemon did when he got this letter from Paul?



PRAY TOGETHER:

Dear Jesus, help us to love others generously as Paul did. Help us to trust that no matter what, You are good! You are greater than our circumstances. Amen.

Say: A man named Onesimus ran away after wronging Philemon. Onesimus met Paul in Rome where Paul shared the good news of Jesus with him. Onesimus chose to follow God. Paul offered to pay whatever debt was owed to Philemon and encouraged Onesimus to return home. LEADER TRAINING: IMAGINATION VS REALITY

In today's story, kids will learn about a vision that God gave to John. While the kids in your group may not have had visions from God, they certainly have great imaginations and can envision creative things. Sometimes preschoolers even blur reality and their imagination, whether that is by having an imaginary friend or pretending something happened that never did. Imagination should be highly encouraged in preschoolers while gently reminding them of reality when necessary. Engage their imaginations as you tell the awesome and true stories of the Bible, helping them pretend to be a part of the story or imagine how the scenes looked.

NAVIGATING A BROKEN WORLD: THE END OF THE WORLD

Many of us have grown up with movies that depicted scenarios of the end of the world, including asteroids, aliens and even zombies. According to a 2022 survey, 39 percent of American adults believe that we are living in the end times. In today's lesson, kids will learn more about how Jesus will return one day and bring about a new heaven and new earth. This is a pretty abstract concept for our littles, and the unknown could make

this a frightening concept for some kids. Lead kids to discuss this with joy, not fear. Jesus will come, as He promised, and make everything new again and take away all sadness, pain and brokenness. Revelation may seem like a difficult book to read, but in fact, it is filled with hope with the repeated message of the promise—Jesus will return and make all things new and God will be with His people forever.

Bible TEACHING

JESUS' RETURN

WELCOME:

Say: Welcome, everyone! I'm so excited to share with you today's Bible story! My name is _____. We have learned so much this month about how God is greater than anything. First, we learned about a letter that Paul wrote to the church in Rome. It is called the book of Romans. Paul taught how Jesus came to save everyone. God is greater than our sin. Show teaching illustration: Letter to Rome (Image 06).

SUPPLIES:

Bible, teaching pictures

PREP:

Say: Then we learned about the armor of God and how we can put it on to stand firm in the truth of God. God is greater than evil. *Show teaching illustration: The Armor of God (Image 07).*

LEADER TIP:

Engage kids in today's Bible story lesson by helping them to be a part of it

Say: After that, we learned how Peter taught people that Jesus is our living hope. No matter what we face, we can always have hope in Jesus! God is greater than our suffering. Show teaching illustration: Peter Preaching (Image 08).

Say: Then we learned about the slave named Onesimus and how he met Paul and after hearing the good news of Jesus chose to follow Him! Paul offered to pay Onesimus the debt he owed his owner Philemon. God is greater than our circumstances. *Show teaching illustration: Paul and Onesimus (Image 09).*

Say: Today, we will learn a true story from the Bible. John recorded what was shown to him about when Jesus would return one day and what would happen next.

Say: Let's take a look at this month's Big Question. Can you help me do a drumroll? Ready? 1, 2, 3 drumroll!




Show the Big Question Teaching Image.

Say: Who is always in control? We'll learn more about this in today's Bible story!



JESUS' RETURN



Hold up a Bible.

Say: Who can tell me the name of this book? *Allow kids to respond.*

Say: Yes! This book is called the Bible. The Bible is the most important book of all. The Bible is full of true stories about how God takes care of His people and loves them. Today we will hear a story from the New Testament in the book of Revelation.

JESUS' RETURN REVELATION 1, 21-22

Say: John was an **apostle** who was punished for telling people about Jesus! He was sent to the deserted island of Patmos as a prisoner. But something amazing happened on the island!

Say: An angel of God appeared to John and showed him many things that were to come in the future. *Show teaching illustration: John (Image 10).*

Say: The angel told John to write down what he saw, and John did! John not only had to listen to what the angel of God said to him, but he wrote it down so we would know what happened! Can you all pretend to write with me? Write super fast! Now, slowly!

Say: God showed John that one day, Jesus would return! Everyone shout, "Jesus will come back!" Ready? 1, 2, 3...Jesus will come back! One day, Jesus is coming with the clouds, and every single person will see Him.Jesus will come back just as He promised.

Say: God showed John a new heaven and a new earth. The old earth had been broken by sin and would be gone. John heard a loud voice say that God will dwell with His people and wipe away every tear from their eyes. There won't be any more sadness, tears or pain





JESUS' RETURN

Say: God promised to make all things new! God will come and **restore** what was broken.

Say: The angel showed John the new earth where the streets of the city were made with gold and the walls and foundations were made of precious jewels. There was no church as God and Jesus were there! There was no sun or moon because the glory of God was the light! John ended the book of Revelation by saying, "Come, Lord Jesus!" Show teaching illustration: New Earth (Image 11).

POINT TO JESUS:

Say: God's perfect plan will be completed one day when Jesus returns. When we believe in Jesus and trust in Him we can live with God forever where there is no more brokenness, pain, or tears.

Say: Let's close in prayer as we wrap up our Bible story time together. Reach your hands up really high.

Reach hands up high.

Say: Now clap them together like this.

Clap hands together.

Say: Let's pray.

Pray: Dear God, You are the beginning and the end. Nothing is greater than You. Help us to share the news of Jesus with others, as we know one day Jesus will come back and make all things new. Amen.



JESUS' RETURN

WRAP-UP:



BIG QUESTION

Say: Now it's time to answer our Big Question. Can you all help me do a drumroll? Ready? 1, 2, 3 drumroll!

Show the Big Question Teaching Image.

Say: Who is always in control? God is!

Say: That's right! The Bible teaches us that nothing is greater than God and is always in control of all things.

REVIEW:


Say: Let's review what we have learned. Let's all point up really high and say, "Jesus will come back."


Have the kids point up and say, "Jesus will come back."

OLDER PRESCHOOL JESUS' RETURN



SUPPLIES:

Painter's tape, index cards, marker, beanbag

PREP:

Create a hopscotch game on the floor with tape. Draw on the index cards or write aspects of "new heaven and new earth" such as no more tears, Jesus is in charge, peace forever, God makes all things new, etc. Tape the index cards onto each square of the hopscotch.



ACTIVITY INTRO:

The Bible teaches us true stories about God. Today we learned that Jesus will someday make all things new. Even though the world we're in is broken, Jesus says that we can trust Him and His plan.

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Ask: What do you think the new heaven and earth will be like?
- **2. Say:** The Bible teaches us that someday, Jesus will make all things new. Even though the world we live in can sometimes be sad or scary, Jesus promises us that we can trust Him and His future plan.
- **3. Say:** Let's play a hopscotch game to help us remember what the new heaven and earth will be like. Here's how we'll play: We'll take turns tossing this beanbag, and wherever it lands, we'll hop to that spot. I'll help you read what the card says, and each square will tell us something really cool about the new heaven and earth.
- **4.** Lead the kids to take turns playing hopscotch. Help them to read the cards that they land on and celebrate what the new heaven and earth will be like.
- **5. Ask:** What makes you most excited when you hear about the new heaven and earth?



ACTIVITY WRAP-UP:

We learned about some amazing things that will happen in the new heaven and earth. Jesus promises us no more tears, peace forever, and that He will be in charge of everything!





Say: John was sent to a deserted island as a punishment for sharing about Jesus. There, an angel of God appeared to him and showed him what would happen in the future. John was told to write it all down as he was shown how Jesus would return and God's new heaven and new earth. Because of Jesus, we can have eternal life with God in heaven.
